

This week's work at FPA Sri Lanka focused on delivering care where it matters most, supporting adolescents and young mothers, reaching workers and communities through mobile clinics, and strengthening youth leadership and humanitarian response efforts.

Mobile Clinic for Sex Workers

Under the Sex Work Policy Consortium Project, a mobile clinic was conducted in partnership with Bloom by FPA Sri Lanka and Trans Equality Trust. This marks FPA Sri Lanka's first programme specifically targeting sex workers, strengthening access to inclusive, rights-based health services for a community that often faces significant barriers to care.

The sessions reached young people and student nurses, strengthening informed decision-making and future delivery of respectful, rights-based SRH care.




FPA Sri Lanka at the SRH Sub-Cluster

Following Cyclone Ditwah, the SRH Sub-Cluster meeting organised by UNFPA Sri Lanka brought partners together to review response efforts. Updates were shared by Outreach Unit representatives on dignity, maternity, adolescent, and transgender kit distributions, mobile clinics, and community awareness programmes, reaffirming commitment to coordinated humanitarian action.

Youth Club Orientation




Youth Club Orientation and SRH Overview Programmes were conducted at the Seethawaka, Ampara, and Kilinochchi Service Delivery Points, strengthening youth volunteers' knowledge on key sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) topics. Sessions covered reproductive health, family planning, HIV and STIs, sexual orientation and gender identity, and the roles of Youth Club members as peer educators, referral points, and CSE advocates within their communities.

Informed youth, stronger communities



Two awareness sessions were conducted by the Moneragala Service Delivery Point at the Wellawaya Town VTA Centre and the Buduruwagala VTA Centre. The programmes reached over 110 youth participants, creating safe spaces for learning, discussion, and informed decision-making.
